KIDDERMINSTER AND NEIGHBOURHOOD.

KIDDERMINSTER, a populous and prosperous market-town, borough and parish, in the lower division of the hundred of Halfshire, is 126 miles from London, 17 from Birmingham, 14 Worcester, 7 from Stourbridge, and 3 from Bewdley; advantageously situated on the river Stour, having the Staffordshire and Worcestershire canal running close to the town. It consists chiefly of two good streets, one of which runs nearly parallel with the canal, and the other is the thoroughfare road from Bewdley to Birmingham; both are well paved and clean, and the town altogether has aspect of respectability and comfort. In the time of King Henry VIII, Kidderminster was noted for its manufactures, first of broad cloths, afterwards of walseys, and subsequently of bombasines, crapes and poplins. But early in the last century the carpet business was introduced here, and has been continued with increasing success up to the present time. In the year 1772 the town and its suburbs contained no less than two hundred and fifty looms, and since that time a larger number has been employed. At first the carpets made here were of the Scotch and flat kind; but soon the cut carpets were invented, and this sort has since continued to be the distinguishing class of Kidderminster. Brussels carpets are also brought to great perfection here, all of which have been so much improved by the ingenuity and emulation of the various manufacturers, in the variety and elegance of the patterns, as well as the permanency and brilliancy of the dyes, as to be unrivalled by any manufactory in the world. Kidderminster received its charter of incorporation in the twelfth year of the reign of Charles I., which allows the body corporate to make bye-laws for the trade, government and police of the town. A recorder, high bailiff, twelve aldermen and twenty-five common councilmen are the officers; the bailiff belongs to the quorum; and no country magistrate can exercise in the borough any judicial authority. Sessions are held for the town and borough; and a court baron occasionally, under the lord of the manor, Lord Foley;

besides a court of market-town, requests every three weeks, for the recovery of, debts under forty shilling. The parish church (now known as the 'Old church') is a large and venerable Gothic structure; the benefice is a vicarage, in the presentation of Lord Foley, and incumbency of the Rev. Archdeacon Onslow. The other place of worship under the establishment is St. George's chapel, lately erected, a very handsome building, and is peculiarly worthy of notice as possessing a proud specimen of carpet weaving, placed over the altar, delineating in vivid colours and fine design 'the Descent from the Cross.' This fine piece of workmanship sustained a short time since much injury from the hands of some sacrilegious villains, whom it is supposed gained entrance to the church for the purpose of plunder, and being disappointed, cut the piece in several places. A reward of £100. was offered, but without their apprehension being effected. The other places of worship are, a chapel each for the independent and Wesleyan methodists, unitarians & baptists. The public schools are, a free grammar school, two church Sundays schools, and others supported by the dissenters. Here is an excellent dispensary, twelve alms-houses, and three respectable reading societies. The soil in the vicinity of the town is in general light and well adapted to the growth of barley; the meadow land is highly productive, and the country is agreeably diversified by gentle eminences. The chartered market is on Thursday, which is a good one for corn; and another has been recently established on Saturday, which is held in a commodious market-place, for butcher's meat and other commodities of domestic consumption. The fairs are Palm Monday, Holy Thursday, June 20th, and September 4th. The population of this town and its dependencies, by the parliamentary returns for 1821, was as follows: the town of Kidderminster, 10,709; the suburb called the 'Foreign,' 2,043; and the chapelry of LOWER MITTON, 2,544: total, 15,296 inhabitants.
